DR. EDWARD KOFI OMANE BOAMAH

MINISTER FOR DEFENCE

Early Life and Christian Foundation

Dr. Edward Kofi Omane Boamah was born on December 26, 1975, at Nkawkaw Holy Family Hospital to the late Mr. Edward Kwame Omane and Madam Leticia Asante (Sister Abena), who hailed from Koforidua Effiduase and Kwahu Obomeng, respectively.

He was baptised at St. George’s Catholic Church in Koforidua and raised in a devout Catholic home in discipline, humility, godliness, and a profound commitment to service. These enduring values shaped his life. From a young age, he was an active member of his faith community. He spent much of his childhood immersed in life at the parish. He served as an altar boy and was a dedicated member — and later President of the Knights of St. John Cadet Corps in the Koforidua Chapter.

Additionally, he was involved with the Boy Scouts, reflecting his early passion for spirituality, service and leadership.

Education

Dr. Omane Boamah attended Koforidua Experimental Basic School and later studied at Pope John Senior High School and Junior Seminary from 1989 to 1996.

He served as Secretary of the School Representative Council (SRC) during the 1995/96 academic year. In this role, he was involved in changes to the fee payment structure and efforts to improve student living conditions.





While in school, he excelled in Biology. After his A-Levels, he did National Service teaching Biology at Benkum Senior High School before continuing to higher education.

Dr. Omane Boamah earned his medical degree from the University of Ghana in March 2006. During this period, he pursued an additional clinical elective at the Washington University School of Medicine.

He later completed a Master's in Health Policy, Planning, and Financing at the London School of Economics and the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine in 2018. Throughout his university journey, he was a steadfast advocate for student rights and quality education.

He served as the President of the National Union of Ghana Students (NUGS). He was elected in 2002. In this role, he was instrumental in holding the government accountable; notably, urging compliance with the provisions of the GETFund Act and ensuring adequate funding for education in Ghana to the benefit of students. During this time, he also published his first book, GETFUND: A NUGS President's Account.

He was also the Coordinating Secretary of the Federation of Ghana Medical Students Association (FGMSA).

Significantly, Dr. Omane Boamah, as a medical student, volunteered in emergency medical rescue operations following the tragic May 9, 2001 Accra



Sports Stadium disaster, providing aid in a time of national grief.

His volunteer spirit also led him to support the Expanded Programme on Immunisation in the Asuogyaman District in 2004, underscoring his deep commitment to the wellbeing of people.

Marriage to Rita Adubea Offei

Dr. Edward Kofi Omane Boamah married his beautiful, intelligent, hardworking and virtuous sweetheart, Rita Adubea Offei on 2nd September, 2006. Dr. Omane Boamah chose Rita's birthday as their wedding day to honour his adorable wife as he remarked during his memorable wedding reception.

Mrs. Rita Omane Boamah is a Chartered Accountant and Development Finance Professional. The two were inseparable and most compatible. He was an exceptionally loving, committed and caring husband. The admirable couple cherished Christian family values and raised their children in the lord. God blessed Kofi and Rita with three children: Akua, Ama and Yaw.

Medical Practice and Humanitarian Service

Upon completion of his medical training in March 2006, Dr. Omane Boamah embarked on a promising medical career. He served with distinction at Korle Bu Teaching Hospital, Bob Freeman Clinic, and the 37 Military Hospital from 2006 to 2008.





Early in his medical practice, his natural leadership qualities were further highlighted when he was elected President of the Junior Doctors' Association in 2006 - a continuation of the commitment to serve and lead.

When he began his postgraduate studies in Medical Physiology, Dr. Omane Boamah heeded to a higher calling to public service when he was appointed Deputy Minister of Environment, Science and Technology in 2009 to serve the nation.

His medical training was also helpful when, as Minister responsible for Communications and Information, he played a pivotal role in Ghana's preparation and response to the 2014 Ebola outbreak in West Africa, demonstrating his dedication to safeguarding public health in times of crisis.

He returned to medical practice at Afram International Hospital in 2017, continuing to bring healing and hope to his patients. Throughout his career as medical practitioner, he showed compassion, dedication to save lives and support for vulnerable people in diverse ways, with many attesting to the lives he touched, and the help he rendered.

Political Career and Public Service

Dr. Edward Kofi Omane Boamah was nurtured for leadership first as a student leader when he was elected NUGS President, then as Spokesperson for Junior Doctors and subsequently through activism as a leading member of the Committee for Joint Action (CJA) and member of the Free Tsatsu Movement.

Deputy Minister Roles (2009–2013):

President John Evans Atta-Mills of blessed memory, appointed Dr. Omane Boamah to serve as Deputy Minister for Environment, Science, and Technology from 2009 to 2012.

He was efficient, dynamic and quickly made a mark.

He worked with his Minister to roll out the then flagship Mathematics, Science and Technology Scholarship Scheme (MASTESS) which benefited some 41,000 students. They also implemented the Free Laptops Initiative for Students and Teachers.

Dr. Omane Boamah led investigations into environmental contamination incidents — he was chairman of the Investigative Committee on the Spillage of Sodium Cyanide in a water body in Kenyase, Ghana, by Newmont Ghana Gold Limited in 2010.

Then in 2011, he was again tasked to chair the Investigative Committee on the Spillage of Low Toxicity Oil Based Mud (LTBM) by KOSMOS Energy in the Jubilee Offshore Field, West Cape Three Points in Ghana. Additionally, he spearheaded a national tree-planting campaign against deforestation.

He subsequently served as Deputy Minister for Youth and Sports (2012–2013), coordinating Ghana's participation in the 2013 Africa Cup of Nations.

Minister of Communications & Presidential Spokesperson (2013–2017):

Appointed by President John Mahama in February 2013, Dr. Omane Boamah led the Ministry of Communications, launching pivotal initiatives such as Ghana's 4G LTE rollout (GOTA) for the security services, the formation of the National Computer Emergency Response Team (CERT GH), and a Child Online Protection Framework. As Communications Minister, he assisted President Mahama to construct Ghana's first National Data Centre, he is credited for the Eastern Corridor Fibre Optic Backbone Infrastructure and he supervised Ghana's rapid nationwide mobile penetration.

From 2014 to 2017, he also served as Presidential Spokesperson after President Mahama merged the Communications and Information Ministries.

International Footprints

Dr. Omane Boamah served as Vice Chairman of the United Nations Commission on Science and Technology for Development (UNCSTD) from 2009 to 2011.

He led the Government of Ghana's delegation to the negotiations at the Conference of Parties to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC), Cancun- Mexico in 2010.

As Communications Minister, he dutifully represented Ghana at Cybersecurity Conferences and Meetings in Asia, South America and Europe between 2013 and 2016. Dr. Omane Boamah was a member of Ghana's delegation to the United Nations General Assembly Meetings in New York- U.S.A. in 2015 and 2016.

His contributions at the Conference on the Swine Flu Global Pandemic: Washington DC - U.S.A., in August, 2009 was most impressive.

Other Positions held

Dr. Omane Boamah served as Policy Advisor and Political Strategist to President John Dramani Mahama from 2017 to 2024 when the NDC was in opposition. From 2013 to 2017, he chaired the Governing Board of the Ghana Investment Fund for Electronic Communication (GIFEC).

He was a Board Member of the Ghana AIDS Commission from 2014 to January 2017.

NDC Director of Elections and IT

Dr. Edward Kofi Omane Boamah was the first person to hold the combined position of Director of Elections and IT in 2024.

He excelled at it introducing a raft of reforms including a novel examination requirement for NDC Polling Agents, putting together a Manual on Elections and establishing a robust electoral collation system.

His initiatives and remarkable leadership ensured that the NDC went into the 2024 elections fully prepared for victory.

Minister of Defence (2025)

In January 2025, President Mahama nominated Dr. Edward Kofi Omane Boamah as Minister for Defence. He received unanimous approval and confirmation by Parliament.

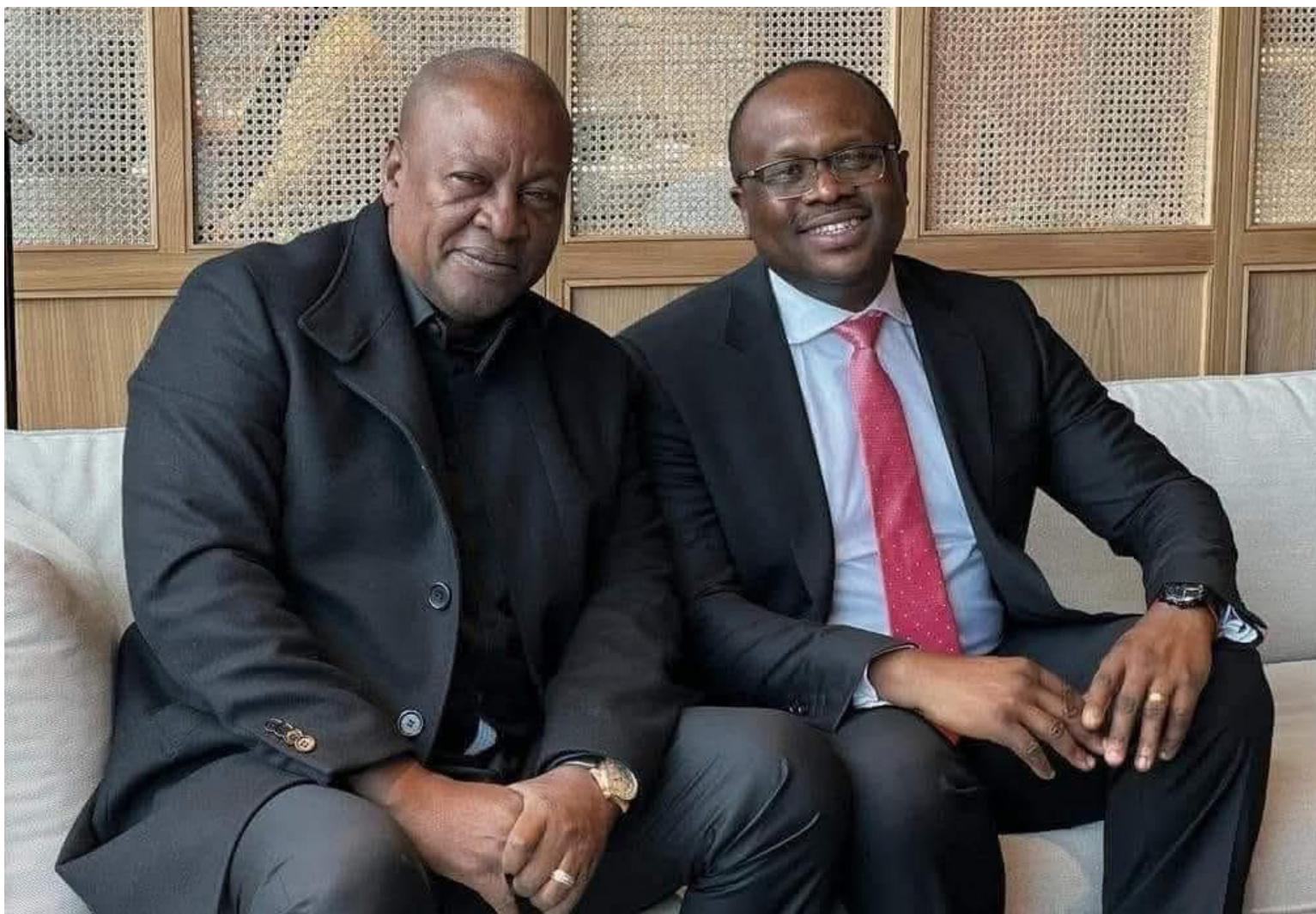
In office, he prioritized military welfare; revealed GH¢3.79 billion in hidden defence debts; advocated for regional fairness in military recruitment; launched recruitment plans for 12,000 new troops; and secured a €50 million EU-financed security support package.

As Defence Minister, he waged a credible, uncompromising and decisive campaign against Galamsey ensuring that military deployments achieved their objectives. A considerable number of forests were liberated from the Galamsey scourge.

As Minister of Defence, he was a distinguished member of the National Security Council chaired by President John Mahama and the Ghana Armed Forces Council chaired by Vice President, Prof. Jane Naana Opoku-Agyemang.

He was the Chairman of the Governing Board of the Kofi Annan International Peacekeeping Training Centre (KAIPTC).

He was also a member of the Ministerial Advisory Board of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.



Publications

Dr. Omane Boamah is the author of “GETFund: A NUGS President’s Account” - A book focused on advocacy in funding education in Ghana (2004);

He also authored the yet to be published: “Professor John Evans Atta Mills — A Peaceful Man in An African Democracy” — the book is currently under review for posthumous publication.

He led the publication of “Accounting to the People, Changing Lives Transforming Ghana” - A book focused on the achievements of the Mahama-led Government of Ghana from 2013 to 2015. He was co-editor of a W.H.O. Ghana sponsored Students’ newsletter focused on preventive health- “The Outreach.”

Tragic end and Legacy

On 6th August 2025, Dr. Omane Boamah died in a devastating Ghana Armed Forces Z 9 helicopter crash near Adansi Akrofuom, en route to Obuasi for an anti-illegal mining and responsible community mining event.

His tragic passing, along with seven other patriots: his colleague Cabinet Minister for Environment, Science, Technology and Innovation, Dr. Ibrahim Murtala Muhammed, Alhaji Muniru Mohammed, Dr. Samuel Sarpong, Samuel Aboagye, Squadron Leader Peter Bafemi Anala, Flying Officer Mane-Twum Ampadu, Sgt. Ernest Addo Mensah, plunged the nation into utter shock, unbearable grief and profound mourning.



He is fondly remembered as a versatile statesman: a physician, devout Catholic, policymaker, environmental steward, communications expert, political strategist, and devoted public servant. His legacy endures in the institutions and reforms he shaped, and in the lives he touched through dedicated service, compassion and integrity.

He encompassed all that a man should be: a loving husband, a caring father, a true patriot, a selfless Comrade, a loyal brother, and a trusted friend.

He was visionary, a thinker, problem-solver, resourceful, diligent, forthright, generous, a strategist, honest in all his dealings, a leader par excellence, and an extraordinary mentor to many young activists.

His golden legacy will live on.

We are in tears, broken and shattered but we can take solace in the promise in 1 Thessalonians 4:16-17:

“For the Lord himself will come down from heaven, with a loud command, with the voice of the archangel and with the trumpet call of God, and the dead in Christ will rise first. After that, we who are still alive and are left will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air. And so we will be with the Lord forever.”

Rest in the bosom of the Lord, Dr. Edward Kofi Omane Boamah.

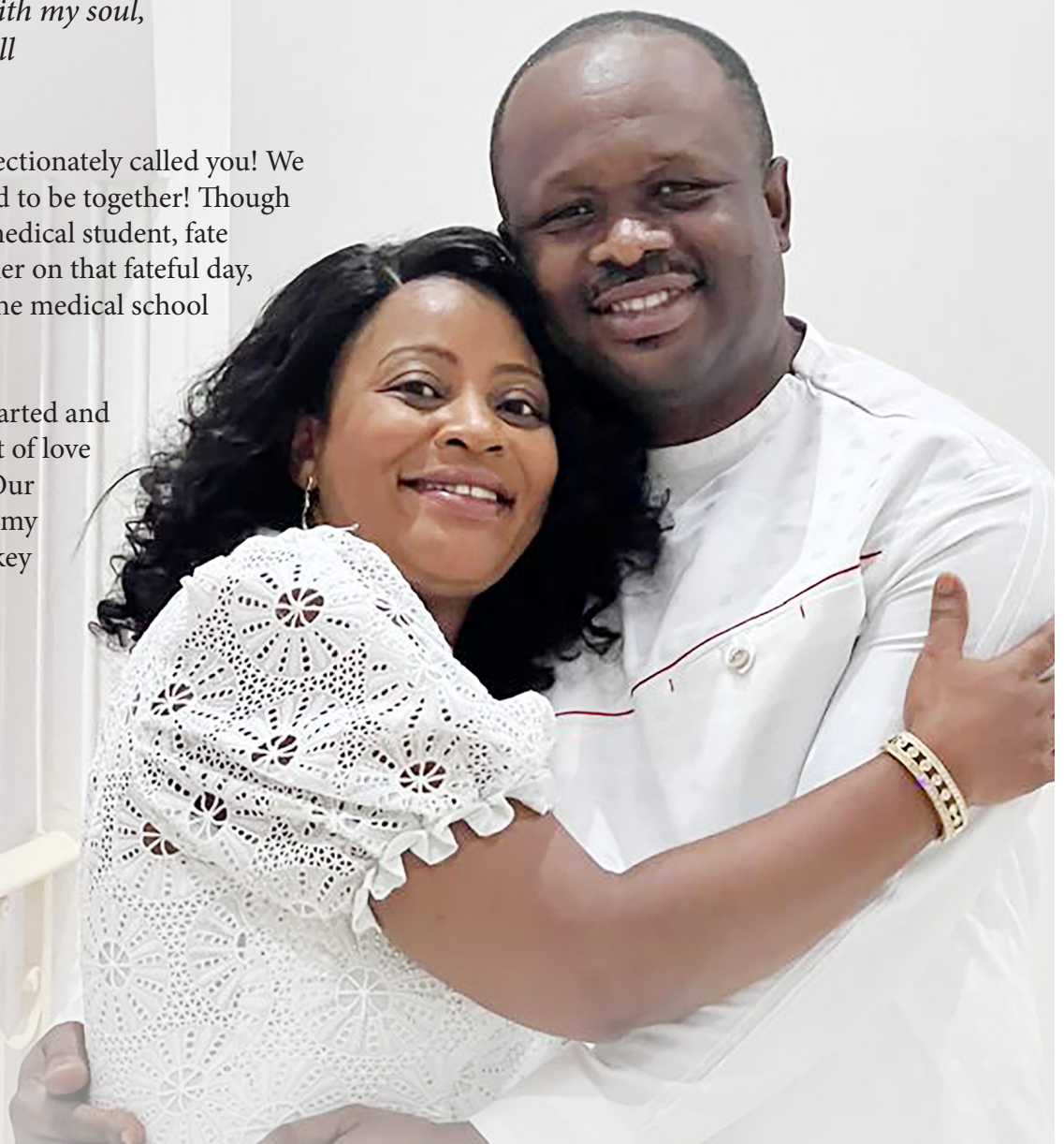
TO MY DEAR HUSBAND, KOFI B!

THE MINISTRY OF DEFENCE

The nation stands in solemn mourning as we bid farewell to an exceptional leader, a visionary and a dedicated patriot, the late Honourable Dr Edward Kofi Omane Boamah. His tragic passing, alongside seven others, in the helicopter crash of 6th August 2025, has left an irreplaceable void in the hearts of Ghanaians, the Ghana Armed Forces (GAF) and the entire Ministry of Defence.

Dr Omane Boamah assumed office at the Ministry on 30th January 2025. His tenure as Minister for Defence, though brief, was marked by transformative leadership, innovation and an unwavering commitment to excellence.

His vision was “To have a modernised and expanded GAF, responsive to the needs of the Country, with highly motivated and happier troops, as well as committed Defence Civilian Staff, for nation building,” this was not just a statement but a mission he pursued with relentless passion.

As a leader par excellence, he believed in collective responsibility,

ensuring that every decision, whether administrative, operational or logistical, was made with the full involvement of his management team. His respect for transparency, due process and legal compliance set a standard for governance that will endure as part of his legacy.

Under his leadership, the Ghana Armed Forces was set on a path to becoming a key player in national socio-economic development. As part of the RESET GHANA AGENDA, he championed the President’s directive to revitalise the Defence Industries Holding Company Limited (DIHOC), envisioning its expansion into a Defence Industrial Development Corporation with private sector integration.

His dream was for DIHOC to spearhead Ghana’s industrial revolution, ensuring self-sufficiency in military production and reducing dependency on imports. Tragically, he was to receive the expert report on this transformative agenda just days after his untimely demise.



Dr Omame Boamah was a leader who empowered those around him. He entrusted his Deputy Minister with significant responsibilities, fostering teamwork and shared purpose.

His support for government initiatives such as the Feed Ghana Programme, 24-Hour Economy and the fight against illegal mining demonstrated his deep commitment to national progress. He directed military units to engage in farming to reduce food expenditure, a testament to his practical and innovative approach to problem-solving.

A medical doctor by profession, he brought his expertise to bear on improving healthcare delivery within the Armed Forces, addressing systemic challenges with precision and care. His problem-solving approach was exemplary. He demanded not just problems but solutions, encouraging critical thinking and accountability at all levels.

Above all, Honourable Omame Boamah was a leader who cared deeply for people.

He made time for everyone from the senior commanders, officers, soldiers through to the civilian staff alike.

His humility, approachability and dedication earned him the admiration and respect of all who worked with him.

As we mourn his passing, though shocked, we take solace in the indelible mark he left on Ghana's defence architecture and the lives he touched. His legacy will live on in the modernised Armed Forces he envisioned, the policies he championed and the lives he inspired. He was a good man with a kind heart. A leader we will greatly miss.

To his family, the Ghana Armed Forces and the nation at large, we extend our deepest condolences. May his soul and the souls of the seven others who perished with him, rest in perfect peace.

Farewell, Our Honourable Minister. Your Service was Exemplary, Your Vision Transformative and Your Memory Eternal.

My Dear Mentor,

Receiving news of the tragedy that claimed your life was the hardest moment of mine. Words cannot capture the depth of my shock, the agitation of my spirit, and the helplessness that has stilled my body.

Until now, I held onto hope that—just as the news came suddenly—I would be met with a pleasant surprise that you had escaped this misfortune. Yet with each passing moment, my hope dissolves into tears, and my optimism fades with every drop.

Until the morning of 6th August 2025, you held all, or at least most, of the answers to the questions that agitated my mind. On strategy, the state of our nation's defence, elections, and the future we must build—you welcomed all my curiosities with patience and wisdom.

Now, I am left with even more questions than ever. But the one who once answered them is gone. I wonder if they will ever be answered, or if they will simply echo in the silence you've left behind—with each new thought a

knock at a door that will never again open to me.

You were not just my boss. You were my role model and my mentor. From the very first time I encountered you years ago, I was struck by the quality of thought you expressed, the depth of industry that flowed from every word you spoke, and the aura and grace you carried into every public appearance. These qualities shaped my view of what an ideal leader should look like, act like, and speak like.

To work as your deputy was nothing short of a dream come true. I still recall, as if it were yesterday, more than 12 years ago on the 30th of January 2013, when I uttered the words that would prove prophetic—that one day, I would love to serve as your deputy and learn under your tutelage. I am in pain, Boss. Deep pain. Forced to confront the cruel truth that the dream of working with you endured longer than the reality.

BIOGRAPHY OF DR. IBRAHIM MURTALA MUHAMMED (MP)

MINISTER FOR ENVIRONMENT, SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY

Hon. Dr. Ibrahim Murtala Muhammed (December 14, 1974 – August 6, 2025) was a prominent Ghanaian politician and public servant known for his competence and dedication. He served as the Member of Parliament for the Tamale Central Constituency and held various ministerial positions.

Education:

He began his education at St. Peter's Primary School (Kulikuli School) in Tamale and continued at Ghana Senior High (GHANASCO). He was a trained teacher with a Teacher's Certificate A from Tamale College of Education (TACE). His academic achievements also included a Master's degree in Development Planning from the Kwame Nkrumah University of Science and Technology, a Master's in International Relations and Diplomacy from the University of Ghana, and a PhD in Political Science from the University of Ghana.

Political and Professional Career:

Early Career: He served as the General Secretary of the All-African Students Union (AASU) in 1999, focusing on educational reforms and youth engagement.

In 2009, he was appointed Deputy National Coordinator of the National Youth Employment Programme (NYEP).

Member of Parliament: He was first elected as MP for the Nanton Constituency in 2012, serving in the sixth Parliament of the Fourth Republic of Ghana. After a loss in 2016, he successfully contested and won the seat for the Tamale Central Constituency in 2020.





He was re-elected to this position in the 2024 elections.

Ministerial Roles:

Under the John Mahama government, he was appointed Deputy Minister for Information and Media Relations (2013-2017) and subsequently Deputy Minister for Trade and Industry. In February 2025, he became the Minister for Environment, Science, Technology and Innovation.

Key Achievements in Tamale Central:

During his time as MP for Tamale Central, Hon. Dr. Murtala Muhammed was credited with numerous projects, including:

Education: Renovating schools, providing free classes and supplies for students, establishing a tertiary education support fund, and introducing a mobile library.

Healthcare: Awarding scholarships for medical students, providing medical equipment, and constructing three health facilities.

Infrastructure: Developing inner-city roads in areas like Changli and Gumbihini, and drilling 80 mechanized boreholes.

Community Development: Securing hundreds of jobs for constituents, providing financial support for women entrepreneurs, and facilitating the construction of an artificial turf field.

Hon. Minister, Dr. Ibrahim Murtala Muhammed assumed duty in February 2025 with a vision to build a robust and

sustainable environmental management, scientific research and technology ecosystem.

The Hon. Minister was passionate about policy development. Within the first half of the year, 2025, he personally saw to the development and completion of key policy documents such as the review of the National Science, Technology and Innovation Policy, Implementation of the Adoption of Electric Vehicle Initiative among others that have received Cabinet approval.

He was a passionate advocate for sustainable environmental development, science, and technology and at the least opportunity whether with development partners, civil society organisations, traditional leaders, religious groups, or others, he made a strong case for these areas as pillars of sustainable national development for our dear nation. His aspiration for a greener future for generations unborn inspired his “One Child, One Tree” project, launched on the

World Environment Day celebrations held in June 2025 which aims to foster environmental awareness, particularly among children and the public to see tree planting as a moral duty and a responsibility. He was instrumental in shaping policies on climate change adaptation and mitigation, plastics waste reduction, biodiversity conservation and responsible natural resource management.

He advocated for stronger inter-ministerial and agency collaboration to address Ghana's environmental challenges. Even in death, he reminds us of the need for government institutions to collaborate with one another, as well as with other partners and stakeholders. To him, this was essential if we were to promote environmental stewardship and achieve sustainable development.

Dr. Ibrahim Murtala Muhammed was more than a Minister; he was a great mentor whose influence extended far beyond his official duties, leading and inspiring staff through the various collaborations he forged with key partners in the sector.

Dr. Ibrahim Murtala Muhammed had an open-door policy, receiving everyone from high-ranking officials to ordinary citizens with the same warmth and respect. He would often say with a smile, "I don't have a door."

His demise is a tremendous loss to MEST, Ghana, and the African continent, particularly in the area of Environment, Science, and Technology leadership. At the recent July 2025 Africa Ministerial Conference on the Environment (AMCEN) in Nairobi, his strong

voice for environmental sustainability earned him widespread admiration and led to his election to the AMCEN Bureau. He was also set to lead the Africa Group of Negotiators' ministerial participation at the ongoing Intergovernmental Negotiating Committee meeting in Geneva.

As we mourn this irreplaceable loss, we must also honour Dr. Muhammed's memory by continuing the work he began. His vision for a more sustainable, technologically advanced Ghana must not perish with him. We owe it to his memory and to the seven other souls who perished alongside him, to carry forward the programmes and initiatives he championed.

Our deepest condolences go to the bereaved family and the entire nation, especially the people of Tamale Central whom he so faithfully represented in Parliament. The Ministry stands with you in this moment of sorrow, united in honouring the life and legacy of this remarkable statesman.

May the soul of Dr. Ibrahim Murtala Muhammed rest in eternal peace, and may his family, friends, and colleagues find solace in knowing that he died as he lived in dedicated service to his beloved Ghana. We take comfort in the words of the Qur'an (2:156): "Indeed, we belong to Allah, and to Allah we shall return."

May Allah grant him Jannatul Firduaz



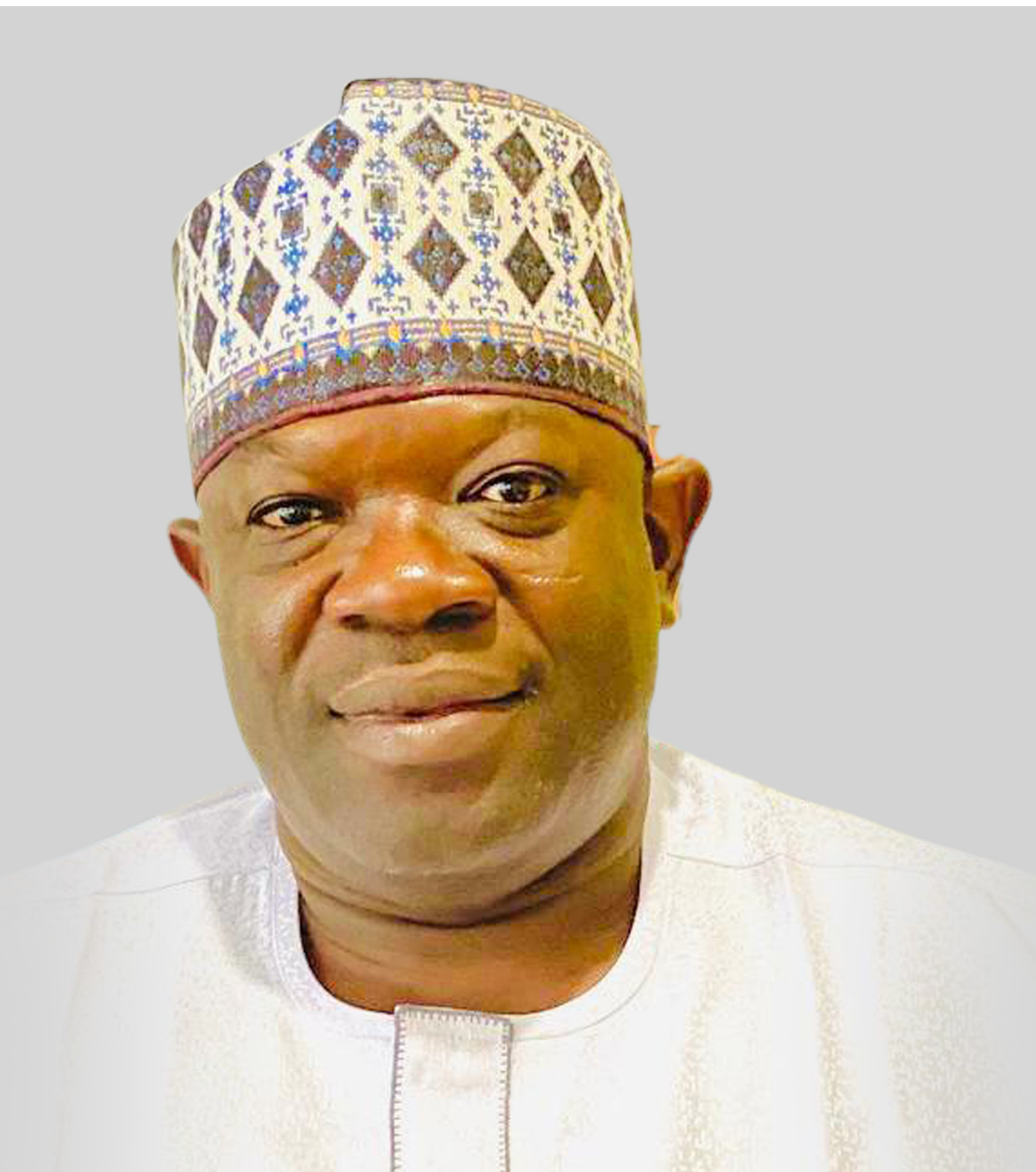
BIOGRAPHY OF

HON. MOHAMMED- MUNIRU LIMUNA

ACTING DEPUTY NATIONAL SECURITY COORDINATOR

Hon. Mohammed-Muniru Limuna was a distinguished Ghanaian public servant, statesman, and administrator whose life was characterized by duty, humility, philanthropy, and an unwavering dedication to the worship of Allah, national service and human development. Born on 8th August 1967 in Wa, in the Upper East region of Ghana, to Alhaji Langa Limuna and Hajia Hawa Soale, he was the second of six children. His life journey exemplified perseverance, leadership, and excellence in public administration, political governance and community service.

From a modest beginning at United Primary School in Tamale (1972–1977), he pursued his education with relentless commitment. He obtained his Junior Secondary School Certificate from Vitting Experimental Junior Secondary School (1977–1980), followed by GCE Ordinary Level certification at Damongo Secondary School (1980–1984). He continued to Tamale Secondary School (1986–1988) for his GCE Advanced Level before enrolling at the University of Ghana, where he earned a Bachelor of Arts in Humanities (1990–1993). Driven by a passion for public service and good governance, he further acquired a Postgraduate Diploma in Public Administration from the Ghana Institute of Management and Public Administration (GIMPA) in April 2005. His pursuit of higher learning took him abroad, where he earned an MSc in Health Policy, Planning and Financing from the University of London's London School of Economics (2006–2007) and a Postgraduate Diploma in Health Policy, Planning and Financing from the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine (2007–2008).



With over 28 years of cumulative public service experience—13 of which were at the highest levels of administration and leadership—Hon. Limuna played vital roles in transforming public institutions and promoting inclusive development. As Minister for Food and Agriculture (January 2016 – January 2017), he led strategic reforms to boost food security and agricultural modernization and laid the foundations for the current Ghana Incentive-Based Risk-Sharing System for Agricultural Lending (GIRSAL) in partnership with the Bank of Ghana. He also spearheaded conceptualization of the Farm Service Centers concept to provide mechanization, credit, extension services, and market access to farmers. While this could not be accomplished before the erstwhile NDC government lost power in 2016, it found its way into the NDC's manifestos, subsequently becoming a pivotal policy in the current Presidency of President Mahama for the transformation of the Agricultural sector.

Between 1995 and 1996, he served as the Organising Secretary of the National Service Personnel Association, demonstrating early leadership and commitment to the development of young professionals. He later became the Campaign Coordinator for the National Democratic Congress (NDC) for the 2016 elections in the Northern Region, and has since served as a member of the Council of Elders of the NDC party in the Savannah Region. His earlier tenure as Northern Regional Minister (2014–2016) and Upper East Regional Minister (2013–2014) was equally transformative. As Chairman of the respective Regional Security Councils, he led peace-building initiatives that resolved long-standing ethnic and chieftaincy conflicts in areas such as Nankpanduri, Bawku, and the Builsa traditional area. His leadership culminated in the historic 2014 Damba festival between the Andani and Abudu royal gates in Yendi, marking a significant step in the Dagbon peace process. He also supervised the construction of six traditional

homes as part of that roadmap to peace and tackled social issues such as cybercrime in the region.

As Minister of State in Charge of Scholarships and Human Resource Development (2013–2014), Hon. Limuna spearheaded reforms in scholarship administration and was instrumental in the development of Ghana's national human resource policy. His contributions extended to the health sector, where he served in multiple roles, including as Administrator and Health Policy Adviser to the Minister of Health, Project Coordinator for the Health Insurance Project at the National Health Insurance Authority (NHIA), and NHIS Focal Officer at the Ministry of Health's Policy Planning, Monitoring, and Evaluation Directorate. Notably, he played a lead role in the nationwide computerization of the NHIS and the establishment of District Mutual Health Insurance Schemes (DMHIS), which enhanced health coverage and efficiency across the country. His earlier administrative roles included serving as Assistant Director of Administration at both the Ministry of Health and the Ministry of Works and Housing. In these capacities, he helped manage resources, prepared strategic plans and budgets, and liaised with the Ministry of Finance and other stakeholders on contract and project execution.

Hon. Limuna's expertise extended beyond national borders. He represented Ghana at numerous international conferences and high-level policy forums, including the Pre-UN General Assembly Conference on Antimicrobial Resistance in London (2016), the China-Africa Local Government Cooperation Forum in Beijing (2015), and engagements organized by the World Bank, Harvard School of Public Health, UNIDO, and GIMPA. He also attended several professional development programs, including courses in project planning, public procurement, consultancy services, governance, and health financing.

A devout Muslim, Hon. Alhaji Limuna sponsored and facilitated the construction of dozens of mosques across the country and sponsored hundreds of Muslims to undertake the Hajj pilgrimage. Hewasalsoacommittedphilanthropist. Through the Tamawuta Foundation—which he established—he sponsored the education of many individuals at various levels, paid medical bills for the sick, provided potable water to underserved communities, and organized health screenings and treatments for countless people.

In the final chapter of his distinguished career, he assumed the position of Acting Deputy National Security Coordinator only a few weeks prior to his passing and was committed to diligently and faithfully executing his duties. Tragically, his dedicated service was cut short by his untimely passing on 6th August 2025.

He is fondly remembered as principled yet light-hearted, respected for his time consciousness, solution-oriented nature, and proactiveness in addressing the challenges facing the youth. He was instrumental in facilitating scholarships for higher education for many and mentored countless young people, particularly from the Northern part of Ghana. In his youthful years, he was a skilful and energetic dancer, earning the nickname “Kisco Darling.” He led and won many dancing competitions in Tamale and Damongo, forming some of his most enduring friendships during that vibrant period of his life.

A man of remarkable intellect, integrity, and empathy, Hon. Limuna was widely respected for his ability to blend policy knowledge with pragmatic leadership. His approach to governance was anchored in inclusiveness, conflict resolution, and sustainable development. He was not only a technocrat and public manager but also a statesman who prioritized the well-being of the most vulnerable, especially in rural communities.

Outside of his public roles, He was married to Hajia Zahara Ligbi. He was a devoted husband and a loving father to four children. Those who knew him personally speak of his humility, kindness, and deep sense of responsibility.

In Hon. Mohammed-Muniru Limuna, Ghana found a servant leader—one who served with vision, led with wisdom, and governed with heart. His legacy remains one of peace, reform, and transformation. His contributions will continue to inspire generations of public servants and leaders.

May his soul rest in perfect peace.

Today, we gather to honour the life of Alhaji Sandapewura Mohammed Limuna Muniru, a scholar and statesman, whose humility, vision, and strength of character touched countless lives.

Born on August 8, 1967, in Damongo Langbonto, Savannah Region, Alhaji Muniru's early education in Tamale led him to the University of Ghana and later to the prestigious London School of Economics, where he earned a master's degree in Health Policy, Planning, and Financing. From his earliest days, his life was defined by diligence, intellect, and an unwavering commitment to service.

Throughout his distinguished career, spanning decades, he served in several capacities, including Northern and Upper East Regional Minister, Minister for Food and Agriculture, and most recently, Acting Deputy National Security Coordinator-Human Security. In every role, he demonstrated not just competence but devotion, serving with professionalism, tact, and pragmatism.

Alhaji Muniru was a strategic thinker who recognised that security in the modern age is not only about the strength of armed forces, but also about addressing the deeper challenges of human security. Long

before non-kinetic operations and human security became common terminology in Ghana's security and intelligence policies, he championed strategies rooted in prevention, dialogue, intelligence, social cohesion, socio-economic development, and strong institutions. His NGO, the Tamawuta Foundation, brought these ideals to life, providing water and livelihood support to deprived communities.

At the National Security Council Secretariat, he initiated the redesign of frameworks that integrated conflict prevention, socio-economic development, and strategic communication into national security and intelligence strategies. His vision was never to replace our armed forces, but to ensure they remained a means of last resort, with peace built on justice, trust, and the well-being of all Ghanaians.

Those who knew him will remember his patience and humility, matched with firmness of conviction. He blended effortlessly with both young and old, approachable to all and welcoming in spirit. Whether one was a colleague, a subordinate, or a stranger, he received you with respect and genuine interest.

Service to Ghana was never a burden to him; it was a calling he embraced with readiness, no matter the time, place, or challenge. To many, he was more than a public servant: he was a brother, a father, an uncle, a leader, and a friend. His passing is not just a loss to those of us who worked closely with him, but to the entire nation he loved and served to his last breath.

Today, as we mourn, we also commit to carrying forward his vision for a safer, more just, and resilient Ghana. May his legacy of humility, commitment, and service continue to inspire us. And may Almighty Allah grant his soul eternal rest.

DR. SAMUEL SARPONG

VICE CHAIRMAN OF THE NATIONAL DEMOCRATIC
CONGRESS

Job 14:1-2 – “Man that is born of a woman is of few days, and full of trouble. He cometh forth like a flower, and is cut down: he fleeth also as a shadow, and continueth not.”

Dr. Samuel Sarpong, affectionately known as Sammy Tugar and Castro, was born on 7th November 1957 at Adadientem to Mr. Kwabena Mensah Sarpong (of blessed memory) and Mrs. Agnes Boakye Sarpong. From humble beginnings, he rose to become a distinguished public servant, politician, and community leader whose life was marked by service, courage, and resilience.

His early education took him through Adadientem, Besease R/C, Sefwi Wiawso, and finally Esease Middle School, where he completed his basic schooling. He proceeded to Osei Tutu Secondary School, then to Wesley College, where he trained as a teacher. He was a cross-country runner and a high jumper. Upon completion, he taught at Juaben Secondary School from 1981 to 1982 as a physical education teacher (P.E) and Asante Twi.

Dr. Sarpong’s leadership qualities quickly became evident, earning him the role of PDC Coordinator for the Ejisu/Juaben District. He coordinated the Programme of Action to Mitigate the Social Costs of Adjustment (PAMSCAD). His pursuit of higher learning and specialized knowledge led him abroad—first to Cuba, where he studied criminology, and later to Bulgaria for further studies.

His professional career was diverse and impactful. He served with the Special Branch (now BNI), the Ashanti Regional Investigation Committee (ASHRIC), which later became the Serious Fraud Office (SFO) and subsequently







the Economic and Organised Crime Office (EOCO). He also served as Acting Director of SFO for the Northern Sector, covering Ashanti, Bono Ahafo, Northern, Upper East, and Upper West regions.

In politics, Dr. Sarpong held numerous leadership roles, including Mayor of Kumasi (2009), Ashanti Regional Minister (2013), Central Regional Minister, and Parliamentary Candidate for Nyiaeso (NDC) in 2016. He also served as Director of the State Housing Corporation. In addition, he later obtained an Executive Master's Degree from GIMPA.

He is the Vice Chairman of the National Democratic Congress (NDC). His commitment to party development was evident in his instrumental role in building the NDC Party Office at Nyiaeso. He treated people equally

irrespective of their color, creed or political affiliation. He was a founding member of the NDC.

A respected traditional leader, Dr. Sarpong was enstooled as Nkosohene of Cape Coast. He was married to Mrs. Hannah Sarpong, and together they were blessed with five children; four boys and one girl.

On that fateful day, Dr. Sarpong's life of service and dedication was cut short when he became one of the eight gallant individuals who perished in a tragic helicopter crash at Sikaman - Brofoyedu in the Ashanti Region.

Dr. Samuel Sarpong's legacy is one of selfless leadership, unwavering patriotism, and a deep love for family, community, and country. His contributions will continue to inspire generations to come.

DEPUTY DIRECTOR-GENERAL, NADMO

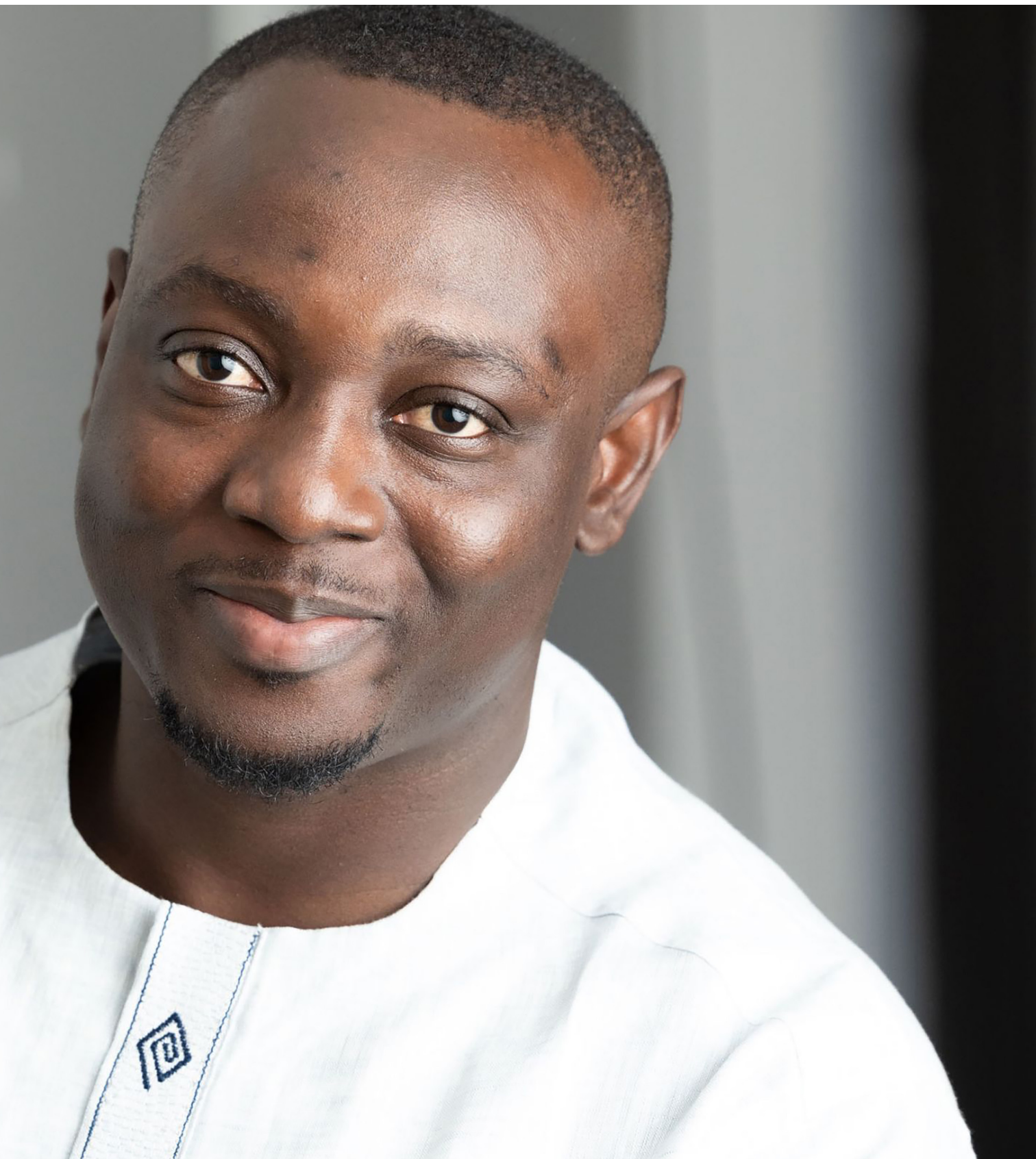
It is often said that the hour of death cannot be foretold. Though we acknowledge this truth, we tend to believe that such a moment lies far ahead in time. Never did we imagine that today, we would be gathered here to remember and mourn our brother Hon. Samuel Aboagye, whose body we cannot identify.

Adu Kwaku, as the family calls him, was born on December 23, 1990, in Damongo, in the Savannah Region of Ghana. His parents are the late Mr. Jeremiah Kwabena Aboagye and Madam Ama Ajubi. The father was an Agric Extension officer at Damongo and later became a businessman upon his retirement and came home to Adansi-Patakoru. The Late Father was the Chief of Patakoru in the early '80s. He was the last child of his parents (Kakyere).

Early life

Hon. Samuel Aboagye started his primary school at the Damongo Cambridge Educational Complex. He joined his parents to return to Obuasi since his father had retired and was getting older. He continued his education at Bekwai, Victory International Complex, and wrote his BECE at St. Philip Catholic Int. School at Tutuka-Obuasi in 2006. He was enrolled at St. Margaret Senior High from 2007 to 2010 for his secondary education. He had his first degree from Accra Business School and proceeded to do his master's program in business administration between the years of 2020 and 2024.







Christian life

Adu was a Christian and member of the Church of Pentecost. He was baptized in water at Damongo in the year 2005. He prides himself as a member of the Church of Pentecost because the whole family attends the Church of Pentecost, of which his elder brother is a Pastor of the Church of Pentecost. His love for God and things in the church were admirable. He was someone who did not hide his Christian faith and was always ready to contribute his quota to the growth and development of his church.

Professional life

Hon. Samuel Aboagye was a promising young man full of business ideas. With the help of his family, he made his first business trip to Germany in 2013 and later to the United Kingdom (UK) and the United States of America (USA). During this period, he also served as a FIFA Licensed Agent, engaging in international sports management and building valuable global networks. He returned to Ghana in 2017 to serve his country and his hometown, Adansi, until the Black Wednesday of this tragic incident, which claimed his life. He was married to Abigail Salami and had two children, all girls.

Political life

Hon. Samuel Aboagye was the parliamentary candidate for the NDC, Obuasi East Constituency, in the 2020 elections. He was again the parliamentary candidate in the 2024 elections, which he won, but administrative errors on the side of the electoral commission wrongfully announced the win to his opponent, for which the case is pending in the law court. The president, John Dramani Mahama, then appointed him as the Deputy Director General of NADMO. It was in this capacity, serving his people and his country, that he got involved in this tragic helicopter crash.

Transition to glory

On the morning of Wednesday, 6th August

2025, news broke out in the social media about a helicopter crash; little did we know that our brother was part of the people who were on the plane. The news sends shockwaves through the family and friends; even now, it remains difficult to accept that our son, brother, and friend is no more with us. The family investment in our brother has gone to waste. Why so soon, Sammy? We take comfort in the Lord that death is not the end; it is but a brief rest for those who walk with the Lord. Indeed, his passing is a profound loss to the family, the church, and the community.

Rest well, Mr. Samuel Aboagye! Your smile, kindness, and humble spirit will remain in our hearts forever.

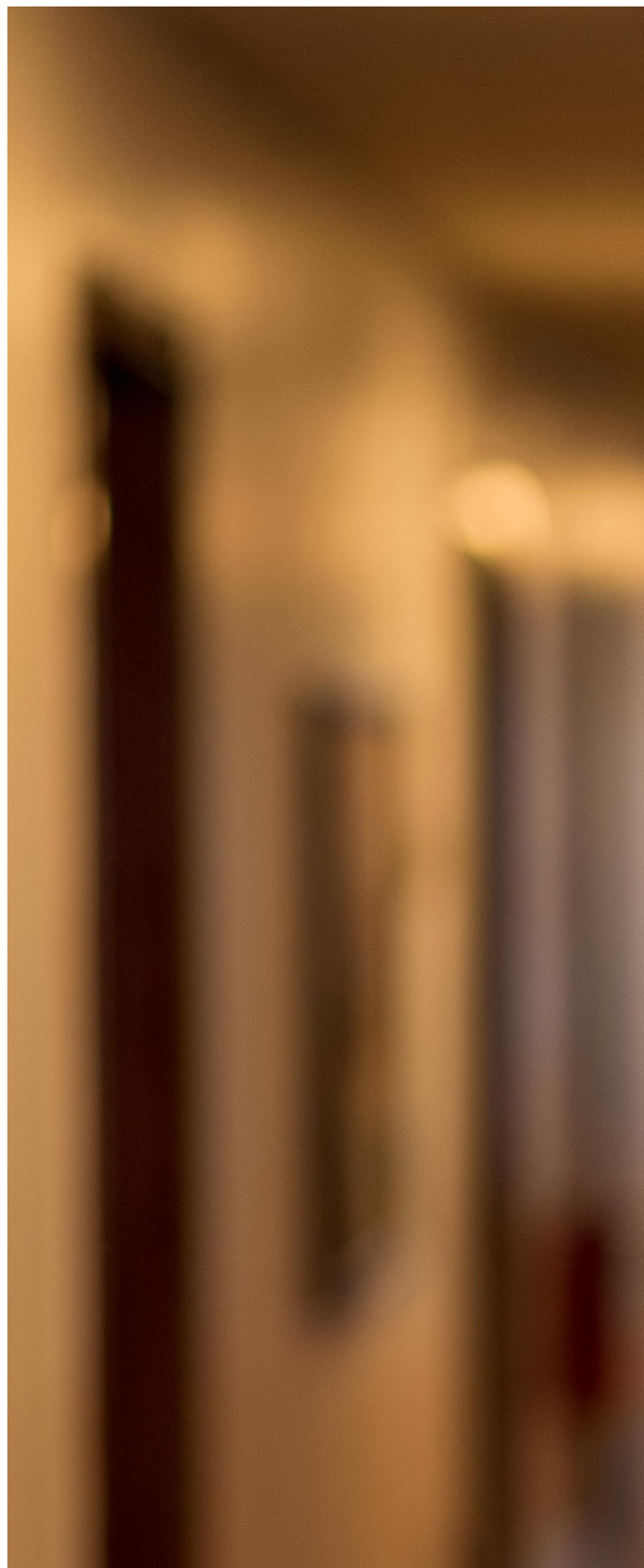
BIOGRAPHY OF SQUADRON LEADER PETER BAAFEMI ANALA (GH/4281)

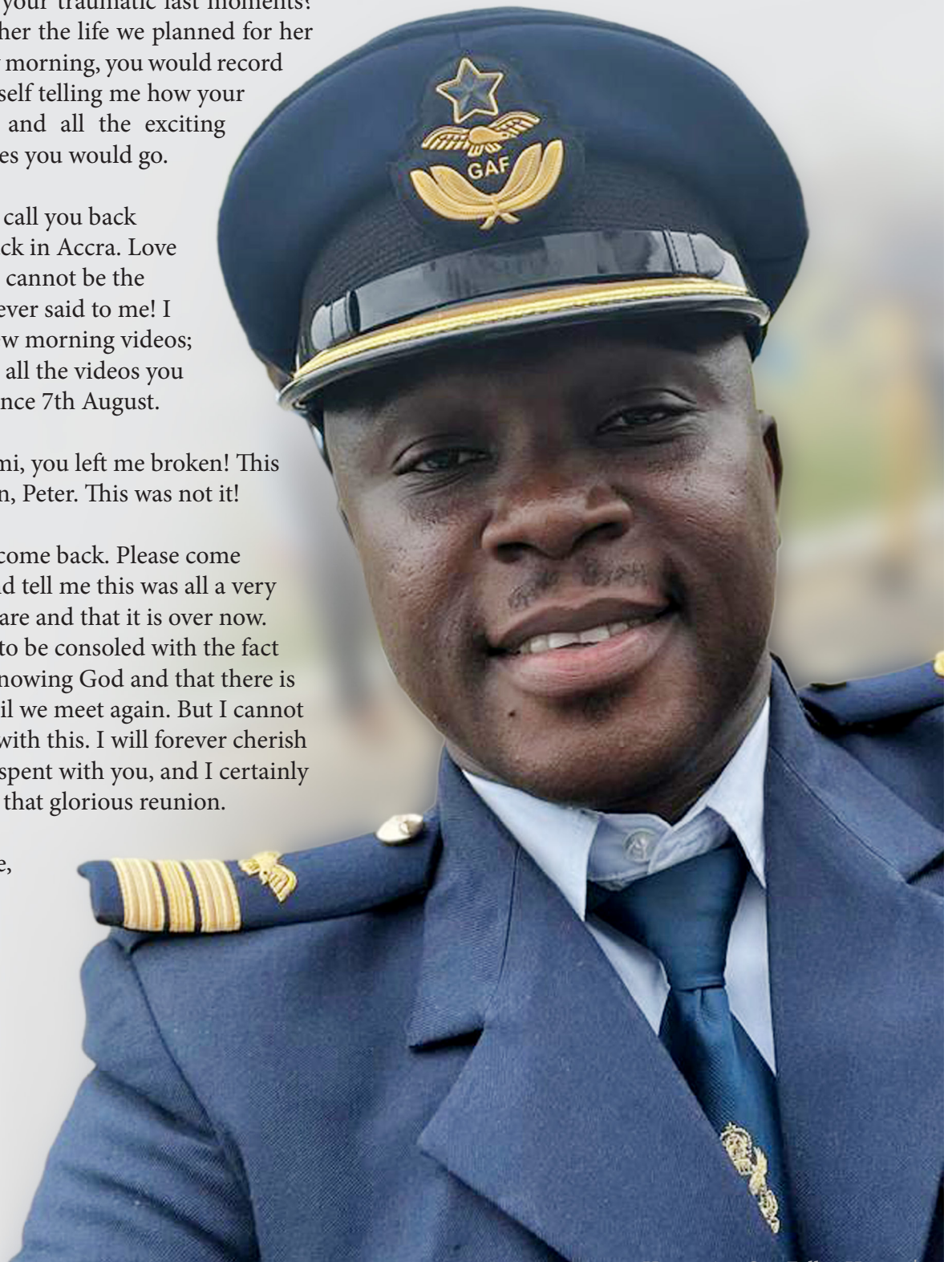



Flying Officer Manaen Twum Ampadu, affectionately known as Papa Twum or Paa Tee, was born on January 7, 1995, in Accra to Rev. MacDouglas Emmanuel Ampadu of Aduama and Mrs. Patience Adjeley Ampadu Abloh of Teshie. Born into royal lineage from the Etena clan of Abene, he was named after his paternal grandfather, Isaac Kwadjo Mensah Twum.

He was raised in Aburi, where his mother worked at the Presbyterian Women's College of Education (PWCE), Manaen was the elder of two siblings. He began his education at Chrisland International School (Aburi) and later attended Deks Preparatory International (Tema), De-Bright International, and Feberck International (Nungua) before returning to Deks International to complete his Junior High School education. Manaem continued his education at Presbyterian Secondary Technical (PST), Aburi, where he developed a keen interest in Geography. He proceeded to Kwame Nkrumah University of Science and Technology (KNUST), earning a Bachelor of Arts in Geography and Rural Development (Second Class Upper Division, 2017). During his studies, he interned at Ghana Civil Aviation Authority and later completed his national service there. He was driven by his childhood dream of becoming a pilot, Manaem enlisted in the Ghana Military Academy in 2020.

A devoted son, brother, and friend, Manaen valued family above all. His marriage on 27 April 2024 to Naval Lieutenant Awura Adjao Kumi-Kyere marked a new and joyful chapter in his life.







He embraced his role as a husband with the same commitment and tenderness that characterised all his relationships. Faith was the cornerstone of Manaen's life. Baptised in 2002 under his father's ministry, he was a devout Fundamental Baptist and an active member of Set Time Baptist Church, where he served as his father's armour bearer on evangelism missions. His leadership extended to serving as President of the Fundamental Baptist Students Fellowship (KNUST). His compassion for the less fortunate was evident in his support for Zion Helping Hand, a charity aiding children in rural communities, and his contributions to Jesus' Kitchen, feeding the homeless.

Beyond his faith and family commitments, Manaen was known for his humility, diligence, and adventurous spirit. He loved football, reading, computer games, and sightseeing, often bringing joy and laughter to those around him. Friends and

colleagues remember his willingness to help, his encouraging words, and his unwavering moral compass. Although he fulfilled a childhood dream by joining the Ghana Air Force and training as a pilot, flying was only one aspect of his rich and purposeful life. Whether in the cockpit, at home, in church, or among friends, Manaen's life was defined by service, love, and integrity.

His passing is a profound loss to his family, the Ghana Armed Forces, and the nation, but his influence lives on in the countless lives he touched. As written in 1 Thessalonians 4:16–17, we hold fast to the promise that “the Lord Himself will descend with a shout... and the dead in Christ shall rise first.”

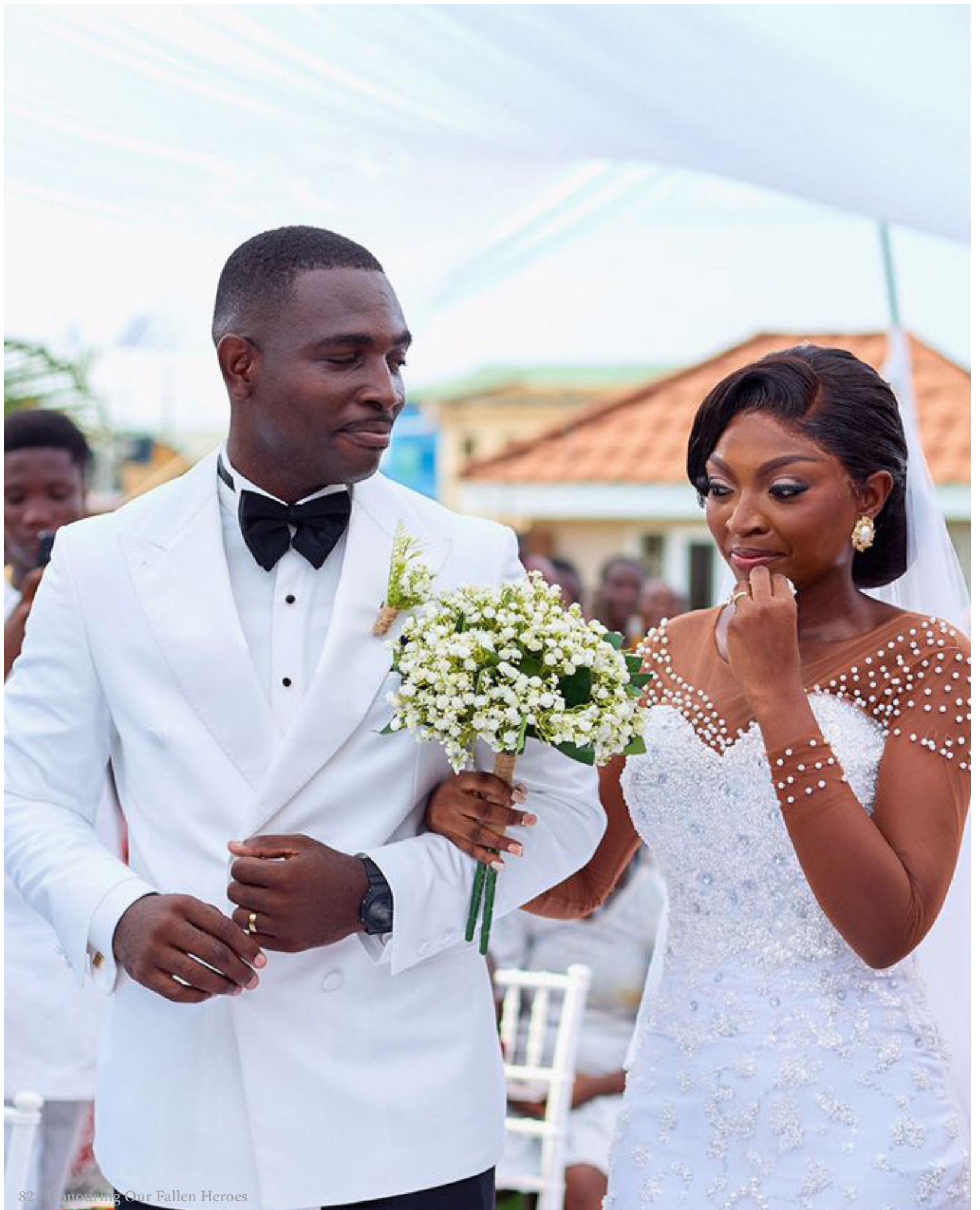

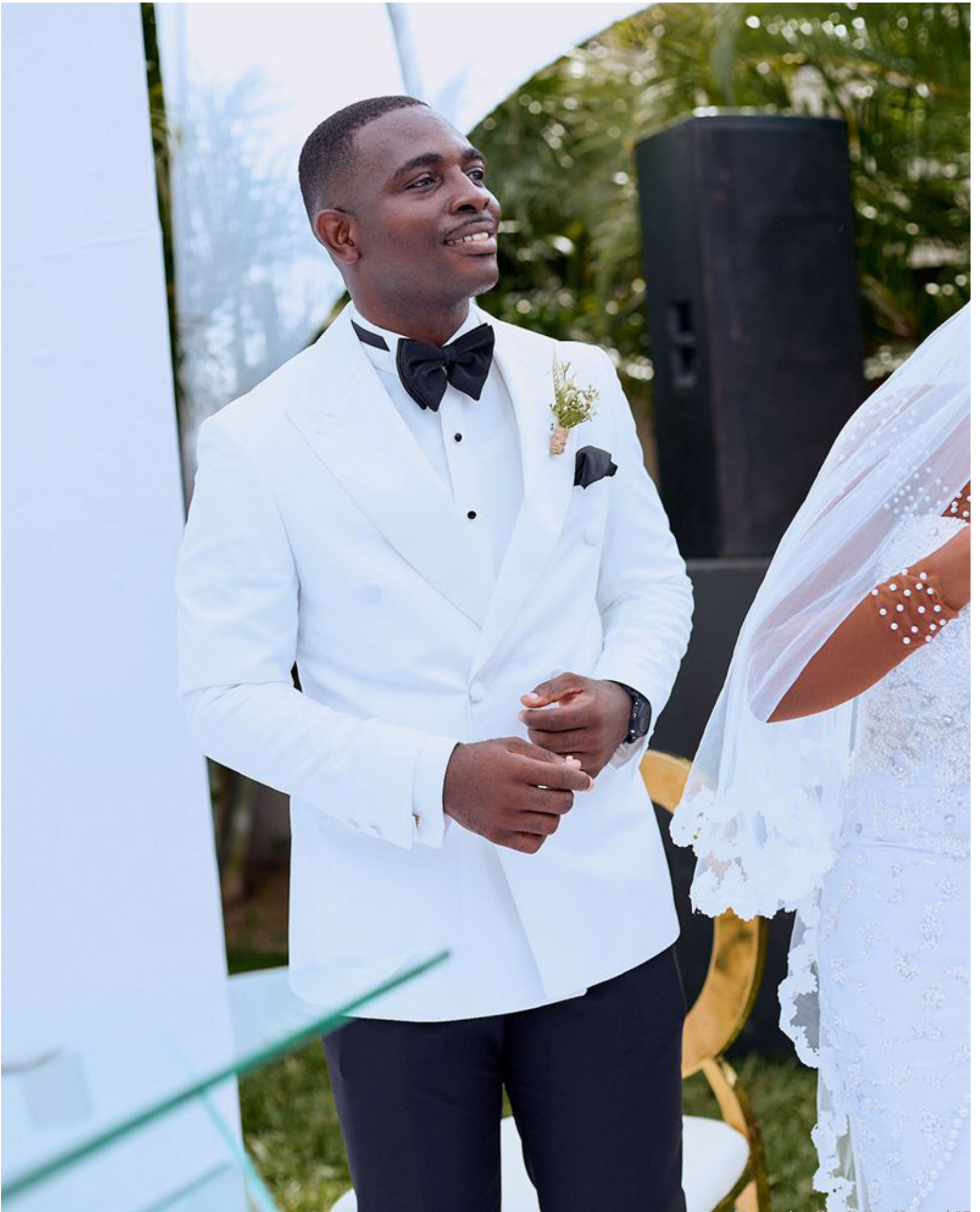

As Minister, he began bold reforms to modernize our Armed Forces, enhance their capabilities, and uphold the highest standards of professionalism. His energy, clarity of vision, and patriotism were unmatched.
- Hon. Ibrahim Murtala Muhammed, Minister for Environment, Science and Technology —

passionate, eloquent, and deeply committed to protecting Ghana's environment while advancing scientific innovation. He believed the fight for our planet's future was also the fight for Ghana's future.

- Alhaji Mohammad Muniru Limuna, Deputy National Security Coordinator — calm, discreet, and courageous. His work, much of it unseen, played a vital role in safeguarding the peace and stability of our Republic.
- Samuel Sarpong, Vice Chairman of the National Democratic Congress — a man of humility and loyalty, respected by colleagues and opponents alike. He was a tireless organizer and a faithful servant of our democracy.
- Samuel Aboagye — A young and promising politician, who served as Deputy Director-General of NADMO with dedication and pride. He loved and cherished the opportunity to serve his country wholeheartedly.
- Squadron Leader Peter Bafemi Anala, Flying Officer Manaen Twum Ampadu and Sergeant Ernest Addo Mensah — The three gallant crew members of the Ghana Armed Forces were disciplined, highly skilled airmen whose lives were defined by the military values of honour, courage, and commitment. They were the silent guardians of our skies, ensuring the safety of every mission they undertook.

Each of these men had a story. Each had a family they cherished, a vision they pursued, and a heart that beat with love for Ghana.

I recall many private moments — late-night calls to discuss pressing matters of state, quiet words of encouragement before a difficult decision, shared laughter in moments of relief after challenges overcome.

They were not only men of duty, but men of warmth, kindness, and humanity. They believed in the Ghana we are building — a nation of opportunity, justice, and unity.

Their absence leaves a void in our leadership and my heart. But the values they lived by — integrity, humility, loyalty — will remain a guiding light for all who follow in their footsteps.

The temptation to ask “Why?” is strong in moments like this. But even as we seek answers, we must remember that unity is the most accurate way to honour them.

This is not a time for division or speculation. It is a time to support each other, comfort the grieving, and renew our shared commitment to the ideals they stood for.

The Government of Ghana has ordered a complete and transparent investigation into the cause of the crash. We owe it to their memory — and to every Ghanaian who serves — to ensure that lessons are learned, and such a tragedy is never repeated.

Though their voices have fallen silent, their legacy will endure. It will be seen in the stronger Armed Forces they helped shape, the environmental protections they fought for, the security measures they championed, and the democratic institutions they strengthened.

May their stories inspire future generations to serve with the same courage, humility, and dedication.

On behalf of a grateful nation, I extend my deepest sympathies to their families, friends, and all whose lives they touched.

May the Almighty God grant them eternal rest. May He heal the broken hearts of those they leave behind.

And may Ghana — the nation for which they lived and died — remain forever worthy of their sacrifice.

TRIBUTE BY THE NATIONAL DEMOCRATIC CONGRESS

*“The beauty of Israel is slain upon the high places:
how are the mighty fallen!”*

The tragic news of the sudden passing of five towering stalwarts of the National Democratic Congress struck like a bolt of lightning from a clear sky. It swept across the NDC fraternity and the nation at large with a force so devastating that it momentarily stilled the breath of all who heard it.

For many, the first reaction was disbelief—surely, this could not be true. It felt like a cruel nightmare from which we would soon awake. Even now, days after confirmation, the reality remains almost unbearable. We are left asking that age-old, aching question: Why do the good, the selfless, and the brave depart so soon? The answer remains elusive—perhaps, as the poet says, “blowing in the wind.”

But who were these men whose departure has shaken the very foundations of our Party? How shall they be remembered in the annals of the NDC? What mark did they leave on our political tradition, our

grassroots movement, and the national conscience?

They were not just members of a political party—they were pillars of courage, vision, loyalty, and sacrifice. They were men of conviction who fought, each in his own way, to keep the NDC flame burning bright.

1. Dr. Edward Omane Boamah

From his earliest days as a fearless student leader as NUGS President, his leadership was already evident. Dr. Omane Boamah’s life was defined by courage, intellect, and unyielding dedication to justice.

He stood up to the NPP government when they withheld GETFund payments, taking the matter to the then-Minority Leader, Rt. Hon. A.S.K. Bagbin, and pursuing it with relentless vigour. For this, he became a thorn in the side of his political opponents, enduring hostility and pressure with unflinching resolve.

Drawn closer to the NDC’s cause, he joined forces with the likes of Hon. Samuel Okudzeto Ablakwa and Bernard Mornah, transforming the Committee for Joint Action (CJA) into a formidable voice for the masses, a living nightmare for the NPP government of the day.

He was one of those brave young activists who personally went to printing houses to monitor the ballot printing process during elections, ensuring the sanctity of the vote.



As part of a vibrant youth wing, they regularly met in the late President Mills' office at Kuku Hill, where strategies were shaped and the future of the Party was charted.

Dr. Omane Boamah's service to Ghana spanned several high-profile roles. Between 2009 and 2012, he served as Deputy Minister for Environment, Science and Technology under the late President John Evans Atta Mills. From 2013 to 2016, during the first term of President John Dramani Mahama, he served as Minister for Communication and

Presidential Spokesperson, delivering his duties with clarity, precision, and professionalism. Upon the return of President Mahama to the presidency after the groundbreaking and emphatic victory of the NDC, he was appointed Minister for Defence, a position he held with candour, grace, and integrity until the tragic event of 6th August 2025, in line with duty.

As Director of Elections, he brought unmatched dynamism to the organisation of campaigns, training of polling agents, and election monitoring.

He mobilised resources, prepared the Party's grassroots with military precision, and oversaw the work of the Electoral Commission with the vigilance of an eagle.

Brilliant, strategic, and utterly fearless, Dr. Omane Boamah was more than a political strategist, he was a fighter for democracy, a compassionate human being, a man generous in spirit and quick to lend a helping hand. His rare blend of intellect, empathy, and resilience made him a treasure to our Party and nation.

2. Dr. Ibrahim Murtala Mohammed

From his early days as a formidable student leader, serving as Secretary-General of the All-Africa Students Union (AASU), Murtala Mohammed's life was steeped in activism, advocacy, and an unshakable belief in social justice.

He retained this spirit all his life, becoming a bold voice for the NDC, both within Parliament and beyond. His speeches were fiery, his arguments unapologetic, and his defence of the Party unyielding. He was passionate to his core, quick to rise to the defence of the oppressed, and unwavering in his commitment to the principles of the NDC.

First elected as Member of Parliament for Nanton in 2012, Murtala distinguished himself as a fearless and articulate legislator. During that period, he was appointed by His Excellency President John Dramani Mahama as Deputy Minister for Trade and Industry, where he served with diligence and purpose. At the time of his passing, he was serving his second term as the MP for the good people of Tamale Central, and was the Minister for Environment, Science and Technology.

Murtala was never one to shy away from a political fight, he met challenges head-on, armed with sharp intellect, boundless energy, and a heart that beat for the people. He would always prefer to be called Comrade Murtala, a testament to his abiding principles of comradeship.

He was, in every sense, a warrior for the cause.

3. Dr. Samuel Sarpong

In the Ashanti Region, often a political battlefield, Dr. Samuel Sarpong stood tall as a steadfast pillar of the NDC. A chip off the old block, he was a young, vibrant, and ardent pupil of the PNDC revolution, whose early public service path took him to the Serious Fraud Office (SFO), now EOCO.

His political career blossomed under the NDC, when President John Evans Atta Mills appointed him Mayor of Kumasi. He would later be elevated by President Mahama during his first term to serve as Ashanti Regional Minister and subsequently as Central Regional Minister. His service also includes leading the State Housing Company as Managing Director before the NDC lost the 2016 General Elections.

From Mayor to Regional Minister to National Vice Chairman, Dr. Sarpong served with loyalty, humility, and quiet strength. His background as a former police officer was evident in his dealings: calm demeanor, reliable, punctual, disciplined, forthright, and committed to the cause to a fault. He was dependable to the core, trustworthy, diligent, and always ready to accept any task assigned to him, no matter how challenging.

His humility endeared him to both grassroots supporters and national leaders. Dr. Sarpong was a leader who believed in service above self and who embodied the quiet dignity of true political stewardship. His passing is a monumental loss to the Party and the nation.

4. ALHAJI MOHAMMED-MUNIRU LIMUNA

Hon. Mohammed-Muniru Limuna was a distinguished Ghanaian public servant, statesman, and administrator, remembered for his humility, philanthropy, and devotion to Allah. With over 28 years in public service—13 at the highest leadership levels—he served as Minister for Food

& Agriculture (2016–2017), continuing reforms such as the Ghana Incentive-Based Risk-Sharing System for Agricultural Lending (GIRSAL) and conceptualizing the Farm Service Centers policy.

As Northern Regional Minister (2014–2016) and Upper East Regional Minister (2013–2014), he led peace-building efforts that resolved conflicts in Nankpanduri, Bawku, and Builsa, and facilitated the historic 2014 Damba Festival between the Andani and Abudu gates in Yendi. Earlier, as Minister of State for Scholarships & Human Resource Development, he reformed scholarship administration and shaped national HR policy.

His career also spanned key roles in the health sector, including leading NHIS computerization and establishing District Mutual Health Insurance Schemes. Internationally, he represented Ghana at major policy forums in London, Beijing, and with the World Bank, UNIDO, and Harvard.

A devout Muslim and philanthropist, he built mosques, sponsored Hajj pilgrims, and supported education, healthcare, and clean water projects through the Tamawuta Foundation. At the time of his passing, he was Acting Deputy National Security Coordinator.

5. HON. SAMUEL ABOAGYE KWAKU ADU

Hon. Samuel Aboagye Kwaku Adu, affectionately called “Adu Kwaku,” was a dedicated comrade and committed member of the National Democratic Congress (NDC). Born on 23rd December 1990 in Damongo, Savannah Region, he rose from humble beginnings to become a respected political leader.

His political career reflected his deep commitment to the cause of the NDC and the development of his people. He first contested as the NDC parliamentary candidate for Obuasi East in the 2020 elections, and again in 2024, where he won but was denied victory due to electoral commission errors, now the subject of a court case.

Undeterred, his dedication to the party and the ideals it represents remained unshaken.

Recognizing his loyalty, President John Dramani Mahama appointed him Deputy Director General of NADMO, where he served with energy and purpose until his untimely passing in a tragic helicopter crash on 6th August 2025. Samuel Aboagye’s death is a painful loss to the NDC, his constituents, and Ghana. His life remains a testament to resilience, loyalty, and unwavering belief in the party’s mission for a better Ghana.

Conclusion

These gallant men were not merely members of our Party; they were the lifeblood of the NDC, each bringing his own strengths, gifts, and fighting spirit to our collective struggle. IN HONOUR OF THE LATE DEFENCE MINISTER AND THE THREE GALLANT SOLDIERS OF THE GHANA ARMED FORCES

The Ghana Armed Forces Fraternity stands in solemn mourning of our beloved former Defence Minister, the Late Dr Edward Omane Boamah and our three gallant crew- Squadron Leader Peter Baafemi Anala, Flying Officer Manaen Twum Ampadu and Sergeant Ernest Addo Mensah who tragically lost their lives in the unfortunate incident that occurred on Wednesday, 6 August 2025.

Dr Omane Boamah's short tenure as Minister for Defence was marked by transformative leadership, innovation and unwavering commitment to excellence. As part of a broader agenda of "Resetting Ghana", he advocated and implemented policies that sought to raise the standards of the Ghana Armed Forces. Paramount amongst these were the retooling and operationalisation of the Ghana Armed Forces, championing merit-based recruitment/enlistment of service personnel, bridging the

accommodation deficit gap of the Ghana Armed Forces, revitalization of the Defence Industries Holding Company Limited (DIHOC) and finally, prioritizing the welfare and health care delivery, including mental health, of troops and veterans.

He was just not a boss or leader, he was a role model and to some a mentor. He empowered those around him thus fostering teamwork and a shared purpose. A first encounter with him was full of quality of thoughts, depth of industry with every spoken word which carried grace and aura. As we mourn his passing, though shock, we take solace in the indelible mark he left on Ghana's Defence Architecture and the lives he touched.

Squadron Leader Peter Baafemi Anala was a pilot whose operational capability combined advanced piloting skills and deep technical knowledge.

He was Commissioned into the Operations Branch of the Ghana Air Force as part of Regular Career Course 54 in 2014. After his Ab-Initio Pilot training in the United States, he was awarded with both a Private and Commercial Rotorcraft Licence and an Advanced Instrument Ratings certification. His integration of flight safety protocols into operational planning enhanced mission success. As a mentor and instructor, he strengthened junior officers' mission readiness and discipline, directly contributing to the Ghana Armed Force's combat preparedness.

Flying Officer Manaen Twum Ampadu was an exceptional young pilot. He was commissioned into the Operations Branch of the Ghana Air Force in 2021 after a distinguished performance at the Royal Air Force Training Academy. He demonstrated outstanding adaptability across diverse mission profiles, coupled with precision in navigation and flight execution. His meticulous approach to mission planning, briefing, and post-mission analysis reflected a deep understanding of operational procedures. Highly proficient in absorbing complex tactical concepts and translating them into flawless execution, he was a dependable co-pilot and a clear prospect for future command in air operations.

Sergeant Mensah Addo Ernest was a highly proficient aircraft technician whose engineering expertise was vital to the operational availability and mission readiness of the Z-9 helicopter fleet at No.8 Helicopter Wing. Enlisted in 2011 and certified in 2016, his diagnostic skills, adherence to airworthiness standards, and ability to execute time-sensitive maintenance tasks under operational conditions directly sustained the Ghana Air Force's operational capabilities. He was also an effective mentor, developing junior technicians to maintain high technical and operational standards.

To the bereaved families, I extend my deepest condolences. May the peace and comfort of the Almighty God be with you. As the bugle sounds and the night holds its silence, we salute them; Dr Omane Boamah, Squadron Leader Anala, Flying Officer Ampadu, and Sergeant Mensah, brave men who served with pride and fell with honour. Their skills and dedication will continue to influence our training, maintenance, and operational doctrines for years to come. They will be sorely missed but fondly remembered.

TRIBUTE TO DR. EDWARD KOFI OMANE BOAMAH

With a heart crushed beneath the weight of grief, I stand before a world that commiserates in sadness, a nation that is grief-stricken and the family of Dr Edward Kofi Omane Boamah that can only be utterly shaken to the core, to pay this untimely tribute in my capacity as a colleague Cabinet Minister to the Minister for Defence of the Republic of Ghana until that tragic event of Wednesday, 6th August, 2025.

On that fateful day, since dubbed Ghana's Black Wednesday, Dr Omane Boamah, onboard a Ghana Air Force Harbin Z-9 helicopter together with seven others, namely: Hon. Dr. Alhaji Ibrahim Murtala Mohammed – MP for Tamale Central and Minister for Environment, Science and Technology, Alhaji Limuna Muniru – Acting Deputy National Security Coordinator, Dr Samuel Sarpong – Vice Chairman of our National Democratic Congress, Samuel Aboagye – former parliamentary candidate, and the flight crew of Squadron Leader Peter Bafemi Anala, Flying Officer Manaen Twum Ampadu and Sergeant Ernest Addo Mensah, were en route to Obuasi in the Ashanti Region for the launch of the Responsible Cooperative Mining and Skills Development Programme (rCOMSDEP) when their aircraft came down near Sikaman in the Adansi Akrofuom District in unconfirmed circumstances. All eight gallant Ghanaians perished in what Chief of Staff at the Presidency, Julius Debrah, described as a national tragedy.

As a nation, we are grief-stricken and mourn as we do because never in the history of Ghana has such a fate befallen us, for high-ranking state officials of

that stature to be lost as they were on that dark day. We grieve but submit to the ways of the all-knowing Allah. Because as we faithfully hold, it is Allah's will that what happened happened and happened as it did, gruesome and devastating as it is.

It is particularly so for Dr Omane Boamah for whom this eulogy goes because we know he was earlier not scheduled to be on that ill-fated flight. What a tragic loss! He was simply formidable, thoughtful and strategic in all he did, a political thinker whose singular preoccupation was Mahama's success driven by his love for mother Ghana.

You were a Founding Member of the Committee for Joint Action (CJA) with Kwesi Pratt, Bernard Mornah and Kwesi Adu among others.

From the night John Mahama conceded to the outcome of the 2016 elections to your untimely and tragic death in a helicopter crash, you served with unalloyed loyalty, dedication and unwavering commitment. Ghana has lost an exemplary Public Servant and son.

You told me and Rita that you were not interested and not likely to accept an appointment into His Excellency John Dramani Mahama's "Second Coming." You told me there were only two threats (to be shared in future or a later date) and God that could stand in the way of now President Mahama's return; and you worked with your Small Team to make it happen.

It is an irony of fate that the Minister of Defence was bereft of the defence he deserved when it mattered most, and the medical doctor was left with option for emergency care. Sad and, as it were, unacceptable as it is, who are we, mere mortals, to question the script of the All-Powerful yet Ever Merciful God.

Even as we've been to the family house to commiserate with the inconsolable Rita and the rest of the family, my heartfelt condolences go to them and the children again. Edward, your death is a terrible blow and very hard to bear, as you died in such a tragic way in the line of duty. May your blood so painfully shed be the caustic cleaning agent that purifies our water bodies from the pollution of heavy metals and restore our degraded forests from the evil of illegal small scale mining, otherwise known as "galamsey".

Omane Boamah and I, besides being trusted and able lieutenants as Cabinet Ministers of His Excellency the President, John Dramani Mahama, share in common a number of notable roles since our respective student days. In that sense and in reality, he was a younger brother to me, and a dear one at that. I am in great pain.

As I was from 1996 to 1997 in a memorable and epoch-making tenure, Edward was also President of the National Union of Ghana Students during his student days at the University of Ghana Medical School. His efficiency and political acumen were honed from those times as he combined the demands of medical education with student politics, also serving as the Coordinating Secretary of the Federation of Ghana Medical Students Association.

Again, Omame received my handing over notes in 2013 as he succeeded me as Minister of Communications during President Mahama's first presidency. At a time when that portfolio was combined with that of Information, he concurrently and ably served as the Spokesman for His Excellency the President. Previously, he had served in Deputy Ministerial capacities for Environment, Science and Technology and also for Youth and Sports during the tenure of

our late and beloved President John Evans Atta Mills. At a time when youth were not being credited with much experience and capacity, Omame Boamah was part of the corpus of we young and vibrant political activists whom President Mills purposefully sought to challenge with ministerial portfolios. And by the grace of God and by virtue of our preparation and the support of Ghanaians high and low, we delivered and lived up to the high expectation of us. Indeed, I was particularly tasked by the Venerable Ato Awhoi to recruit some of such student activists from NUGS to be appointed Ministers and Omame Boamah turned out to be one such vibrant and promising young politician.

Indeed, Omame Boamah has been described as the midwife who helped deliver NDC's resounding 2024 electoral victory in his capacity as the Party's untiring Director of Elections and IT. His brilliance and ability to quickly find solutions to problems and as a strategist inspired President John Mahama to entrust him with the high office of Defence Minister. It is regrettable that you have been so cruelly snatched away from us just seven months into the victory you worked so hard to achieve, and while our arduous duty to reset Ghana has just begun.

Like a gallant warrior, you went on an important mission to help save our nation from the canker of "galamsey". As Defence Minister, you led the charge in a military helicopter to help battle Ghana's current existential threat of illegal small scale mining. You showed leadership. But alas, and heart-wrenchingly so, it was a mission of no return. But as the blood of the martyrs is the seed of the Church – as your beloved Pope John's Senior High School and Minor Seminary would have taught you – your work and the ultimate price you paid will never be forgotten. I have lost a brother and a friend. Only you could calm me because you understood my irrepressible and optimistic temperament. You would tell them, "Leave Haruna to me."



As we commit the mortal remains of my Friend, Brother and Colleague into the bosom of Mother Earth, I hark to the words of the immortal lines the Armed Forces call forth to bid farewell to their fallen heroes – the Binyon Verses:

Omane, “[You] shall not grow old, as we that are left grow old.

Age shall not weary [you], nor the years condemn.
At the going down of the sun and in the morning we
will remember [you].

Rest in perfect peace, Dr Omame Boamah. The memory of you was to work for Mahama to succeed. Yes, indeed, and you began to succeed in that resolve with our electoral victory.

Fare thee well My Brother and Friend, Dr Edward Omame Boamah – Minister for Defence of the Republic of Ghana: January 20, 2025 to August 6, 2025.

CELEBRATING THE MARTYRS OF AUGUST 6

EULOGY IN HONOUR OF THE MEMORY OF DR. EDWARD KOFI OMANE BOAMAH BY SAMUEL OKUDZETO ABLAKWA (MINISTER FOR FOREIGN AFFAIRS AND MP FOR NORTH TONGU)

Shattered, devastated, speechless, shaken, traumatized, heartbroken, horrified, depressed, petrified — all these words fail to do justice to our current tribulation.

I ask, where is our omnipotent, omnipresent and omniscient God?

We are told God's ways are not our ways, but who will dare convince us that this is God's way?

When we were asked to disregard the forces with power over the body and focus on our creator who has power over the soul — we were never really prepared for this day.

No human being deserves to die in this manner.

Certainly, our 8 martyrs — for all their exploits, kind deeds and good works for our dear country, definitely did not deserve to depart this world in such unspeakable circumstances.

The martyrs of August 6 — Dr. Edward Kofi Omane Boamah, Alhaji Dr. Ibrahim Murtala Muhammed, Alhaji Muniru Mohammed, Dr. Samuel Sarpong, Samuel Aboagye, Squadron Leader Peter Bafemi Anala, Flying Officer Mane Twum Ampadu, Sgt. Ernest Addo Mensah — all these noble compatriots have not only come to represent the mystery of life, they now epitomize courageous patriots who will

eternally be celebrated locally and internationally.

As Ghana's Foreign Minister, I have been deeply moved by the overwhelming tributes from world leaders and international organizations of great repute. I am particularly touched by the painstaking efforts by these leaders to personally reach out to President John Mahama and the Foreign Ministry to convey their heartfelt condolences and high regard for our fallen heroes.

Indeed, a man's worth is not to be measured by mere longevity but by the impact they had.

I dedicate this eulogy in honour of the memory of Dr. Edward Kofi Omane Boamah — for our extraordinary relationship is no secret.

When I met Dr. Omane Boamah some 23 years ago, he was already a well respected and deeply admired student activist. His tenure as NUGS President was considered successful and consequential by many, regardless of their ideological persuasion.

In our passionate conversations those days, Dr. Omane Boamah will go on and on about how the legendary Ernesto Che Guevara inspires him.

He was the first to present to me books and manuals on revolution from Che.

Omane Boamah and Che Guevara had a lot in common — the rare phenomenon of medical students who made time for activism, medical doctors who believed revolutions heal better than medicine, frontline activists who sacrificed for a fair and just society until the very end.

And like Dr. Che Guevara, Dr. Omame Boamah died on the frontlines of active service — Che, fighting for political justice; Omame, fighting for environmental justice.

Fortuitously, they were both taken away in their prime — Che at 39, Omame at 49.

Dr. Edward Kofi Omame Boamah was my big brother, comrade, confidante and ever-present political ally.

He was the only person to read my draft NUGS manifesto. He offered valuable inputs to make it the winning manifesto at that fiercely and closely contested 2005 NUGS presidential election where I won with a 6 vote margin.

He had served as NUGS President some three years prior to my election. He was an outstanding President.

His famous GETFund agitations as leader of NUGS, which he later chronicled in his first book titled: GETFund: A NUGS President's account, helped preserve statutory allocations to the GETFund.

He ought to be credited for successfully stopping diversions and under-declarations from the GETFund as NUGS President. By that defining intervention, he contributed greatly in preserving the fund which is today a major source of President Mahama's visionary educational policies, notably: the No Fees Stress initiative, GHS50million Research Fund and Free Sanitary Pads.

When I won the NUGS presidency, Dr. Omame Boamah became my chief advisor and strategist extraordinaire.

The impact of my tenure is a reflection of the treasure trove of perspectives and generous guidance he willingly offered.

Our relationship grew stronger, closer and deeper even beyond student activism and national politics.

I did not hesitate when Dr. Omame Boamah asked me to MC his wedding to beautiful, gracious, sharply intelligent and self-effacing Rita in 2006.

I was also deeply honoured when he asked me to accompany him to the Korle Bu Teaching Hospital on that joyous occasion when Akua — his first daughter, was born in 2007.

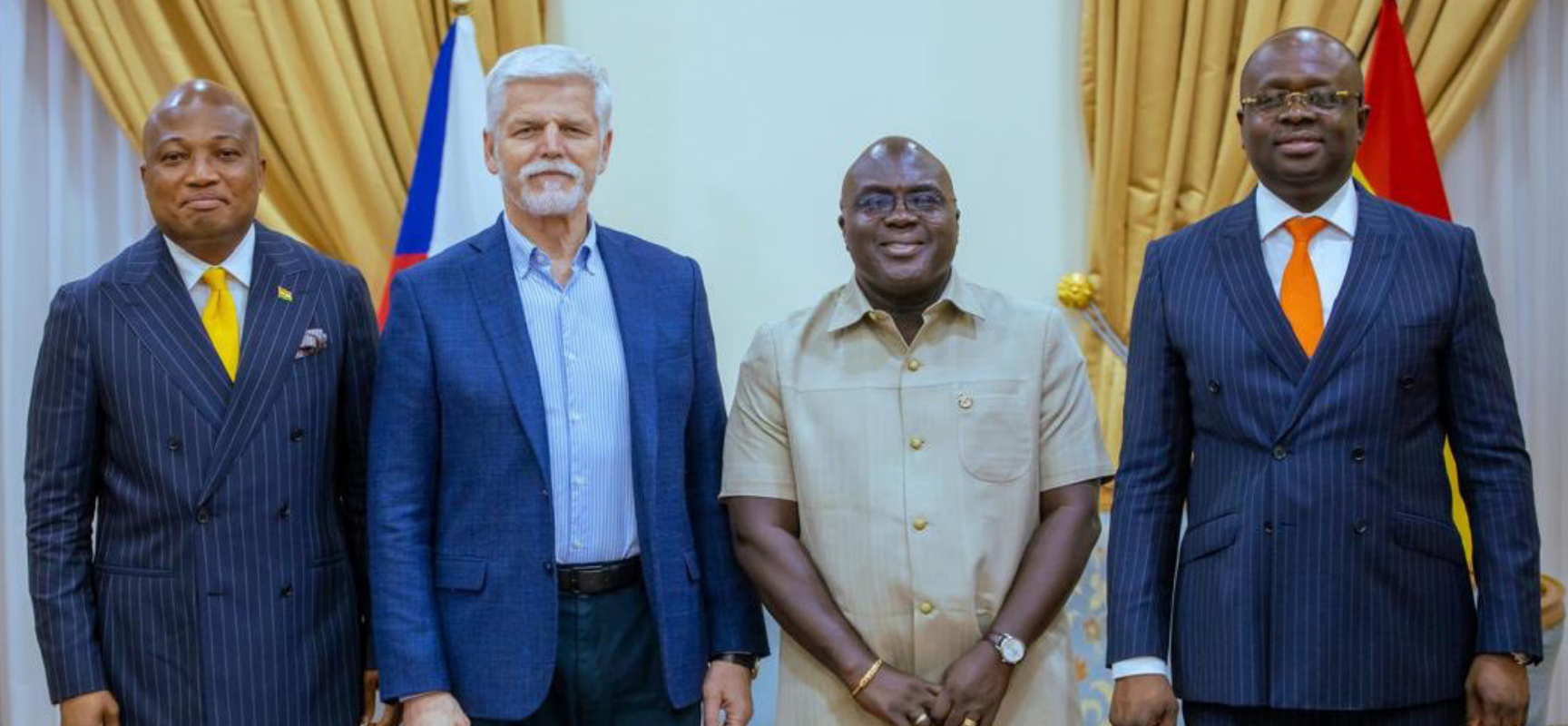
We were always there for each other to commemorate milestones. He travelled to Wa with me for my own marriage ceremony.

When I decided to contest as MP in my beloved North Tongu, he was with me in every single village during my first primaries in 2012. He was a true and loyal brother.

When Uncle Ato Ahwoi set out to recruit me into the Committee for Joint Action (CJA) and the NDC on the instruction of Prof. John Evans Atta Mills, it was Dr. Omame Boamah who facilitated the process — having by that time, honed his skills for political conspiracies of this nature. It is worth remembering that he was also recruited by Uncle Ato.

As CJA activists, we were both privileged to learn at the feet of stalwarts such as Uncle Ato Ahwoi, Dr. Obed Asamoah, the late Dr. David Pessey, Comrade Kwasi Pratt Jnr, Comrade Kwasi Adu, Comrade Kyeretwie Opoku, Alhaji Ahmed Ramadan and the late Danny Ofori-Atta.

Of course, His Excellency Prof. John Evans Atta Mills of blessed memory and His Excellency John Dramani Mahama, our current President, were keen participants in CJA events across the country between 2006 and 2008 — we have always been immensely grateful for their mentorship.



Dr. Omane Boamah was a brave activist, despite police brutalities during CJA demonstrations, he never stopped organizing more. His mantra was: let's organize not agonize. I know he would prefer we organize in helping President Mahama achieve his reset agenda for Ghana instead of agonizing over his painful loss — but that is not an easy ask.

I do recall the unwarranted machinations of misguided national security operatives in a chaotic attempt to scuttle a 2008 CJA demonstration in Tamale with helicopters. The choppers were made to stir up dust, Omane continued in the leadership of that eventful mammoth demonstration much against the strong advice from a few of us who knew he was asthmatic and therefore had to avoid such unfavorable conditions — he defied us. Omane survived the 2008 helicopters, he didn't survive the 2025 helicopter.

Then there was that scary strange highway gun attack we suffered around Techiman on our way to organize a CJA demonstration. Those gun shots riddled through the commercial bus we had boarded with remarkable precision leaving passengers injured. Dr. Omane Boamah, Felix Kwakye Ofori, Captain Doudou and my good self have not stopped thanking God for that narrow escape.

Dr. Omane Boamah joined the NDC by choice and after sober ideological reflection following numerous engagements with Uncle Ato. He opted to become a member when the NDC was in opposition during the Kufuor presidency. Having been born in an NPP family and having been issued a party card by the NPP's first National General Secretary, Mr. Joseph Agyenim Boateng — which he wasn't afraid to show some of us — he could have chosen to easily align with the ruling NPP at the time after his NUGS presidency where the reward would have been immediate and bountiful — instead he chose his conscience and his conviction, not personal comfort. That is how he became a formidable leading member of the NDC.

Dr. Omane Boamah earned his appointment from President Mahama as Minister of Defence through years of hard work, loyalty, sweat, toil, deep thinking and sacrifice.

His extraordinary output as NDC Election Director where he formulated an impregnable strategy to protect the votes of the Ghanaian people, to famously activate body cameras, and to secure for the NDC the most emphatic electoral victory in history is no mean feat. It takes a very special comrade to achieve that.



Omane Boamah was not only an activist, thinker and political strategist, he was also a policy wonk. Many do not know that he was the brain behind Free Primary Healthcare and the Mahama Cares programme.

Dr. Omame Boamah was an exceptional father. We all admired him for how he made considerable time for his dear wife, Rita and children: Akua, Ama and Yaw. He was uncompromising about quality family time and family obligations. The time he spent teaching his children at home made us question the fairness in making him pay the same school fees as other absentee daddies.

When he admonished us to always make time for family, I thought his deliberate planning, time-management and commitment for family was shaped exclusively by the tragic loss of his father when he was in medical school, it could never have occurred to me that like his own father's early departure, there would be a sad recurrence, hence his remarkable fatherly role in laying a solid foundation for his children. And I can proudly confirm, having spent long hours with his amazing family, particularly in these difficult moments that he really did an excellent job.

Before his call to glory, Dr. Omame Boamah was working on two books — one to celebrate Prof. John Evans Atta Mills and the other about his political journey and proximity to President John Mahama. He was kind to share some of the scripts with me.

May I humbly appeal that we collectively ensure a posthumous publication of these two books as an enduring and befitting honour to his memory.

I am eternally grateful for all you did for me, bro — this is not how we planned it — but I know God is preserving your soul in a much better place.

Finally, may we sincerely resolve that the deaths of our 8 fallen heroes would not be in vain.

Let us all relentlessly and genuinely support President Mahama to achieve the environmental justice for which the 8 Martyrs made the ultimate sacrifice.

Rest well, all you martyrs of August 6.

Ghana and the world shall never ever forget your sacrifice.

Mba Gabu-Naa Wuni Yamusah was the son of the late Chief of Gbimsi, Kug-Raan Yamusah. Kug-Raan Yamusah was the son of Mamprugu's 22nd King, Naa Sigri Sulemana. As a result, Hon. Dr. Murtala Mohammed was an in-law of Mamprusi and the entire Mamprugu kingdom.

Hon. Alhaji Muniru Limuna, on the other hand, had a close relationship with the Mamprugu kingdom and held high regard for His Royal Majesty Tiduguma Nayiri Naa Bohagu Abdulai Mahami Sheriga during his tenure as then Northern Regional Minister, which included the Northern, North East, and Savannah regions.

Hon. Alhaji Muniru Limuna played a significant role in resolving the long-standing Konkomba-Bimoba conflict that plagued the Mamprugu kingdom a decade ago. The crisis was amicably and permanently settled thanks to his efforts as regional minister and influential Konkomba and Bimoba opinion leaders. Bimoba and Konkomba leaders, as well as youth, convened at the Nayiri Palace in Nalerigu in 2015 and smoke a peace pipe and have since lived peacefully.

Hon. Alhaji Muniru Mohammed Limuna is equally an in-law to Mamprusi and the Mamprugu kingdom, as he's married to a daughter of the late Alhaji Ligbi from Gambaga. This shows how we're interwoven as a people and gives us more reason to be united in the midst of this unfortunate tragedy. We urge all well-meaning Ghanaians to heed to His Royal Majesty Tiduguma Nayiri Naa Bohagu Abdulai Mahami Sheriga's call for national unity in the wake of this national tragedy.

Our thoughts and prayers are with the immediate families of the deceased, particularly our sisters, the wives of Hon. Dr. Murtala Mohammed and Hon. Alhaji Mohammed Limuna and their children our nephews, as well as our sister kingdoms, Dagbon and Gonjaland, and the nation as a whole.
